

- M1F Ellen MacDermot, *m.* James Farrell. Here again the writer has had insufficient time to contact the descendants, and particulars are urgently needed to complete our records.
- Ellen McSwiney, *b.* —; *d.* many years previous to her husband, James Barry Farrell, who was for many years County Surveyor of Wexford, and was then of Glendara, co. Wexford; he was *b.* in Bristol about 1800, and *d.* 1893. They are buried at the Franciscan church at Wexford. They had,
- M2F1 Martin Farrell.
- M2F2 Stephen Farrell.
- M2F3 Edward "Ned" Farrell.
- M2F4 Bride Farrell, *d.* in Belgium, *c.* 1905. *unn.*
- M2F5 Ellen Farrell, *b.* 1853; *d.* at Camberley, Feb., 1937; *m.* Lt.-Col. Swain, Royal Inniskillings. He *d.* at Camberley, 1922.
- M2F6 Kate Farrell, *b. c.* 1860; *d.* in London, *c.* 1944; *m.* L. Devereux, "Larry" of Rocklands, Wexford, and had,
- M3F6A Nicholas Devereux, long since dead.
- M3F6B Anne Devereux, *m.* Mr. Massaroni.
- M3F6C Eily Devereux, *m.* Mr. Caffieri.

This ends the list of 90 of the descendants of Morgan O'Connell, of Carhen, through his 4th dau., Bridget, as they were recorded on 4 Nov., 1948.

#### ALICIA O'CONNELL, OF CARHEN

- N. The 5th dau. of Morgan, of Carhen. She *m.* William Francis Finn, of Tullarone, who sat in Parliament for the county of Kilkenny, 20 Dec., 1832, and 14 Jan., 1835. In the Parliament of 12 Aug., 1837, he no longer represented Kilkenny. There was no issue of the marriage, and it is believed that Mrs. Finn was for many years a widow. Details are required of the lives of these two people.

#### CATHERINE O'CONNELL, OF CARHEN

- O The 6th dau. of Morgan O'Connell. The recorded details of this sub-branch are few, indeed, and here again help is needed. Catherine *m.* Humphrey Moynihan, of Rathbeg. He being the second son of the then Moynihan of Rathbeg. On his marriage a property worth £1,500 was settled on him. I am indebted to a member of the family for the following note: "About the Moynihans—their only descendants appear to be the Devitts. Devitt was a solicitor in Limerick, and his son, Tom, was there in 1884-5, and so they ought to be traceable. I remember old Dan Moynihan, son of Catherine O'Connell. He used to stay at Headfort in the early '80s, but not later. . . . He had the house at Freemount—always a good horse and greyhounds, and came to us for the races. He had an annuity payable to him when his middle interest in his property was taken over."

Other notes about the Moynihan family are:

List of Aghadoe and Ardferit wills:—

Moynihan, Humphrey, Rhabeg, co. Kerry, *d.* 1766;

Moynihan, Darby, Surgeon, Killarney, 1776, codicil, 1779.

In the list of "Papists signing the New Test Act of Allegiance at Killarney," 7 Mar., 1776, there are 102 names, of whom 3 are Moynihans (2 described as "gentlemen" and one as a farmer.

In 1911 some big drapery establishment in London became possessed and offered for sale silhouettes of all Kerry notables, taken by August Edwart, a French artist, in the 1830 period. This historic collection was, therefore, broken up. Mary Pauline Lady O'Connell bought the silhouette of Sir James O'Connell and Sir Berkeley Moynihan, of Leeds, bought that of Dan Moynihan. Such a collection in its entirety would have been invaluable for the historian.

Catherine, *d.* 10 Oct., 1867, and Humphrey, who *d.* before 1867, had,

- O1A Humphrey Moynihan, *m.* Miss Biddington, *d.s.p.*
- O1B Mary Moynihan, who was alive on 4 Aug., 1875, and attended the High Mass in celebration of O'Connell's birth (*Centenary Record*, p. 93), *d.s.p.*
- O1C Daniel J. Moynihan, of Freemount. He got into some trouble in 1861, probably of a political nature, and was living at Lakeview in the latter part of the 80's. He *d.* 1894, *d.s.p.*
- O1D Kate Moynihan, a nun.
- O1E A dau., probably Elizabeth, *m.* J. Devitt, Solicitor, of Limerick, and had,
- O2E1 Thomas Devitt visited Cork, 1883; lived in Limerick, 1884-5.
- O2E2 Kate Devitt, a nun
- O2E3 Alicia Devitt, a nun.

This ends the list of 8 of the descendants of Morgan O'Connell, of Carhen, through his sixth dau., Catherine.

#### JAMES O'CONNELL, OF LAKEVIEW

- P James was the fourth and youngest son of Morgan O'Connell, of Carhen. Unlike his brothers and uncles, who were men of very powerful physique, he was a sickly youth. He was *b.* 10 Jan., 1786. Educated at St. Edmund's College, Ware, in England, and spent much of his youth in England. He *m.* on 31 Mar., 1818, at Killarney, Jane, dau. of Charles The O'Donoghue of the Glens. The wedding was performed by the Rt. Rev. Dr. Sughrue, Bishop of Cork—the son of James' aunt, Joan O'Connell, of Darrynane. Charles The O'Donoghue of the Glens, *b.* 1777, *d.* 21 Feb., 1808, was the only son of Daniel The O'Donoghue, *d.* 1800, by Margaret, *d.* 18 Dec., 1788, dau., and heir of Mortagh McMahon, of Clonina. Daniel's father was Geoffrey The O'Donoghue, *b.* 1722, *d.* at Tullogh, 7 Sept., 1758, and buried at Muckcross Abbey. He had *m.* Elizabeth
