

- RE1A Rickard Charles O'Connell, B.L., b. 1805 ; d. 1880. Nicknamed "The Challenger." Educ. T.C.D., 5 Oct., 1821, B.A., 1826. His passport to Paris, 24 July, 1844, is preserved. He m. Euphemia (Effie) Matthews, whose portrait is preserved at Darrinane. She was sister of the very beautiful Jessie Matthews, who d. young, aged 18, a miniature of whom is at Dunbeg. They were the dau. of Benjamin Matthews, Collector of Excise for Kerry, 1825-1843. Because of the wave of temperance engendered by Father Matthew's teachings, there was inadequate work for him in Kerry and Government decided to transfer him elsewhere. He promptly resigned. He d., aged 82, "in his house at Nelson Street, Saturday last," but no date is given. Rickard Charles was living at Kent Lodge in 1877. They had
- RE2A1 Mary Sophia O'Connell, b. 1854 ; d. 30 Jan., 1933, at Dublin. She was one of the old school of family genealogists. She did an infinity of work upon the subject, but because it was not printed, little of it except jottings remain. It is because of this sort of wasted effort that the present writer determines to press on with the printing of such information as we have and not to wait for more comprehensive (and accurate) details. She was known in the family as Mary Rick.
- RE2A2 Rickard de Sales O'Connell, b. 1858, and d. at Blackrock College, where he was a student (11 Sept., 1875-29 Jan., 1876). Even at this early age he showed promise as a poet. A printed poem, "A Wanderer's Thoughts," survives at Dunbeg.
- RE2A3 Rickard Bligh O'Connell, d. young.
- RE2A4 Effic Alice O'Connell, d. young.
- RE2A5 Maurice V. de P. O'Connell, b. 27 Oct., 1860 ; d. 13 July, 1945. He m. in 1883, Maria Alicia Coppinger Cronin (Q4C5B4), and carried on the line.
- RE3A5A Rickard Joseph O'Connell, b. 17 Feb., 1885 ; late of the National Bank and, in 1950, Head of the Spa Branch, who has greatly helped the writer with information. He m. 2 Oct., 1917, at St. Barnabas Church, Molesley, Surrey, Grace, dau. of George Bolton. He lives at Dunbeg, Spa, and had
- RE4A Maurice Geoffrey O'Connell, b. 31 Jan., 1919. An Able-Seaman, Royal Navy, who, with all his comrades of H.M.S. *Stronghold* were destroyed in the gallant execution of their duty in the face of overpowering Japanese force in the battle of the Java Sea, 1942.
- RE4B Rickard Mathew O'Connell, b. 3 Nov., 1923. In 1950 working in the Financial Dept. of the West Riding Board of Health. m. in St. Joseph's Church, Pontefract, Yorks, 29 July, 1950, Joan, dau. of Cecil and Clare Smurthwaite.
- RE4C Daniel Charles O'Connell, b. 3 Feb., 1930 ; of the Hibernian Bank at Drogheda (since Jan., 1949).
- RE3A5B Maurice O'Connell, of 13 Charlemont Terrace, Cork, who has helped in the compilation of this record, b. 23 April, 1887. Employed in Munster and Leinster Bank, Cork.
- RE3A5C Mary Alice O'Connell. Lives with her brother at 13 Charlemont Terrace. Employed in National Bank.
- RE3A5D Euphemia (Effie), b. 15 July, 1893 ; d. 14 Oct., 1943, at 13 Charlemont Terrace. Late of the National Bank.
- RE1B Maurice Charles O'Connell. In 1840 a Lieutenant in 73rd Regt. ; Capt., 5 April, 1844. In 1850 was at Cape of Good Hope. Major in the Kerry Militia, 17 Aug., 1859. He d. *unm.*, in 1897. It is worth recording that we have seen recently a photo of the Kerry Militia taken in the 'Sixties. We know he is in the large group, but we don't know which he is. On being handed to three separate individuals and asked to spot which he is each has pointed out the same officer. There he sits, with his hawk nose, dominating the whole picture, his legs crossed in the typical fashion. Such is the heritage and all that remains of the heritage of our Conway ancestors. A snuff-box presented by him to the Kerry Militia is preserved at Lakeview.
- RE1C Alice O'Connell, d. before reaching maturity.
- RE1D Jessie O'Connell, d. young.
- RE1E Rickard O'Connell.
- RE1F Mary (1) d. in infancy.
- RE1G Mary (2) never married.
- RE1H Honora O'Connell, b. c. 1820 ; d. 1885 ; m., either in 1840 or 1842, Charles Riley, then an undergraduate at Cambridge, and a ward in Chancery. He was the son of Captain Edward Riley and Anne Sophia, dau. of Col. Wilkinson. Both Edward and Col. Wilkinson were serving in India, and Edward married there. Edward had five children. After the birth of the first three, Alexander, Sophia and James (afterwards of 48th Regt.), Charles and Anne Sophia took a trip to Australia, where the fourth child, Charles, was born. Edward took up land in Australia. Subsequently a fifth child, Frances Elizabeth Riley, was born. She ultimately m. Charles Daniel O'Connell (see below RE1J). Edward Riley was the third son of George Riley (1740-1829) who m., in 1777, Margaret Raby (1757-1829). Honora and Charles had
