Bridget O'Connell was the 4th dau. of Morgan O'Connell, of Carhen, and is believed to have been b. about 1780. She m. Myles McSwiney, of Kenmare. Notes on the McSwiney family were all destroyed by the Japanese in 1942 and there has not been time to reconstruct them. The McSwineys were a powerful family in the Kenmare and Kilgarvan area, and wills of Morgan McSwiney, of Cork, 1721, Morgan McSwiney, of Kilnagorey, 1797, and Morgan McSwiney, of Macroom, 1802, are mentioned by Vicars, whether they are connected to Myles is not yet rediscovered. The McSwineys lived at Dromguinah House, Kenmare, which was held under a lease to Terence McSwiney by a Mahoney who held the lands from Lord Shelbourne (1693). Dromguinah was sold to Daniel O'Connell, 81837. Bridget and Myles had 6 children, Nicholas McSwiney, the eldest, who m. Miss C. Fitzherbert, d.s.p. Daniel O'Connell McSwiney, m. Anastasia Farrell.
