He used to stay at Headfort in the early '80s, but not later. . . . He had the house at Freemount—always a good horse and greyhounds, and came to us for the races. JAMES O'CONNELL, OF LAKEVIEW

James was the fourth and youngest son of Morgan O'Connell, of Carhen. Unlike his brothers and uncles, who were men of very powerful physique, he was a sickly youth. He was b. 10 Jan., 1786.
